Lieutenant Colonel H. R. CARTER VD

[1875 - 1934]



Colonel Carter was President of the Club in 1930

Hubert "Bertie" Reginald Carter was born in Brisbane on 31 January 1875. His father was Arthur John Carter [1847-1917], from St. Ives, Huntingdonshire, England, who became a prominent Brisbane businessman, company director and member of the Queensland Legislative Council [1901-1917]. He had lived briefly in France before entering the underwriters' room of Lloyd's of London in 1863.

John married Jane "Jennie" (née Nodes) [1847-1871] in London in February 1867 and in January 1871 the family reached Brisbane by the *Light Brigade*. His wife died in May of that year, leaving him with three young sons (who all died in Brisbane):

Arthur Charles [1867-1883]
 Frederick Walter [1868-1940]
 Harry Gaudin McLean [1870-1872]

On 9 November 1872 Arthur re-married - a widow, Frances Eliza Elgin Koch (née Johnson) [1845-1936]. They had four children, of whom Hubert was the eldest:

- Maude Isabel [1877-1928] In 1899 married William James Forsyth [1874-1936] in Brisbane. They both died in Sydney. They had two daughters and a son.
- Francis Joseph Alexander [1880-1959], an insurance inspector. In 1911 he married Barbara Eleanor (nee Summerlin) [1882-1961]
- Mabel Winifred [1886-1903]

Hubert was educated by private tutors and at Brisbane Grammar School (1889-1892). He passed the Sydney Junior Examination in 1891, and the Solicitors Preliminary in 1892. He qualified as a solicitor but in 1893 entered his father's business. In 1914 he was manager of the Atlas Assurance Company.

Hubert married Violet May (née Smith) [1883-1966] in 1909 in Brisbane. They had four children:

- Margaret Jacqueline [1910-2003] (sometimes Jacqueline Margaret) In 1938 she married Ronald Cyril Mundell ¹ [1900-1941] in Sydney. He was born in Miles, Queensland and was an entomologist. They lived in India from 1938. In 1942 she married Sir John Frederick Sleight ² [1909-1990] in Lincolnshire UK. They had a son Richard (b. 1946). After her husband's death she returned to Australia and lived at Surfers Paradise.
- Marion Elizabeth "Betty" Wrenne [b.1911] In 1932 married Colin Anderson Gray [1905-1966] of Sydney in Brisbane. Lived in Sydney. Divorced in 1939.
- Vivienne Olive [1912-1970] In 1936 married George Frederick Purdy [1905-1965] ³ of Sydney in the New Hebrides. Lived in Brisbane and North Tamborine.
- Arthur Barton "Ted" [1919-1999] ⁴ A solicitor and company director. Married Sheila Mary Mulholland [1917-2009] in 1944 in Brisbane They had six children - Rosemary, John Barton [1950-1977], James, Peter, Paul, and Margaret-Anne,

They lived at the family home "Nunnington", Kangaroo Point.

Hubert's military career was varied and extensive:

March 1900 Provisional Lieutenant
July 1900 First Lieutenant
1901 Honorary Captain

He served in South Africa in the 5th (Queensland Imperial Bushmen) Contingent from February 1901 to May 1902. He was severely wounded in

January 1902.

1909 Captain, Brigade Major Queensland Infantry Brigade

1910 1st Infantry Regiment

1912 7th Infantry (Moreton) Regiment

September 1914 Captain AIF

November 1914 Major, Second in Command 15th Battalion AIF. He served on Gallipoli until he

was wounded at Gaba Tepe on 10 August 1915. Later invalided for 3 months

leave in Australia

November 1915 Medically "... unfit for return to active service but could be utilised as OC of

transport or of a Depot Battalion."

Then followed a series of AIF Sea Transport Service commissions as OC

Troops on voyages between UK and Australia, including:

December 1915 A50 HMAT Itonus

December 1916 A64 HMAT Demosthenes
July 1917 A32 HMAT Themistocles

For a brief period in early 1916 he served with 53rd Battalion and commanded 4th Pioneer Battalion on their raising in Egypt prior to deploying to France in

June 1916.

1918 7th Infantry (Moreton) Regiment

1919 Unattached List

1920 promoted Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel on moving to the Retired List.

He was second State President of the Returned Sailors' & Soldiers' Imperial League of Australia in 1918-19. He remained active in business until his death.

The then Captain Carter served on the Club Committee in 1909-10 and again, after his presidency, in 1931-33. Club records are incomplete for the period 1910-28.

Colonel Carter died at his home at Kangaroo Point on 14 July 1934.
